We also had a fundraiser for the American Heart Association to honor 2 fallen angels that were taken from us by heart disease. We lost Coach







Heart Association.


Diana United Fund

Here are a few suggestions for you to be able to help your child/children prepare for their STAAR tests:

The Night Before

- Visualization: Have a conversation with your child about what the day will look like.
- · Get a good night's sleep. Kids need a full 8 hours of sleep.
- Self-Talk: give your child a few phrases that can motivate him/her "I just need to do my best!" "I can do it." "Stay cool."
- · Answer any fears or questions your child might have.



 Prepare your child's snacks, pencils, clothes, etc. the night before.

On STAAR Testing Day

- Eat a good, healthy breakfast.
- Do a relaxing activities like taking deep breaths, tensing muscles and then relaxing them, talking about something unrelated to STAAR.
 - Arrive early or on-time to school.
- Feel free to leave cell phones, backpacks, hand-held games at home.
- Wear layers so your child is comfortable in any temperature.
 - Remain calm and positive.



Help NASA Measure Trees with Your Smartphone

Healthy forests play a crucial role in Earth's ecosystem as growing trees take up carbon from the atmosphere. NASA satellites and airborne missions study forests to see how carbon moves through ecosystems - and now citizen scientists can help investigate this key question as well by using their smartphone to measure tree height.

The GLOBE Observer app provides a step-by-step guide for people to collect scientific data on their surroundings. With the new GLOBE Trees feature of the app, observers record tree height by tilting their phone up and down to align the screen with the tree's top branch and base, and pace off the distance to the tree; the app does the rest to calculate the tree's height.

"With the GLOBE Observer, everyone can become a citizen scientist and easily take measurements to better understand their local ecosystem," said Brian Campbell, GLOBE Trees science lead. Observers can measure one tree or hundreds. The data points - along with a GPS tag of the tree's location – are sent back to NASA and collected in a database. Anyone can visualize all of the tree height and other GLOBE data simply by visiting the GLOBE website.

The GLOBE Program has helped teachers and students gather scientific data for more than 20 years, and expanded in 2016 with GLOBE Observer to bring in other citizen scientists as well. The tree-height project is the latest in a suite of tools that people can use to study their surroundings, following efforts to observe clouds, mosquito habitat, and land cover.

The land cover tool allows citizen scientists to document the vegetation and terrain around them, Campbell said, and adding in the height measurements gives a more complete, three-dimensional portrait of the ecosystem. Scientists need that third dimension to calculate how much carbon is stored in a tree or in a forest - and now citizen scientists can collect the data as well.

Tree height measurements could also help scientists working on NASA missions like the Ice, Cloud and land Elevation Satellite-2 (ICESat-2), which uses a laser to measure the height of Earth's surface below them as they orbit our planet.

"ICESat-2 will measure the heights of forest canopies worldwide - and the GLOBE Observer app is another way to collect even more data," said Tom Neumann, ICESat-2's project scientist at NASA Goddard. Citizen scientists in the United States and in more than 100 other countries will gather tree heights from many more places than the ICESat-2 scientists alone could measure.

"GLOBE measurements are going to be useful for the validation of tree heights we're getting from ICESat-2," Neumann said. Once the GLOBE data starts coming in, the mission will analyze the information to see where a cluster of citizen scientist measurements overlap with ICESat-2's measurements, and compare the two sets. "It'll be interesting to see what the difference is."

Chem Club

The New Diana ChemClub was chartered in June 2013 as a club for any student interested in Chemistry. ChemClub gives high school students a unique opportunity to experience chemistry beyond the classroom. Students engage in activities that enhance their understanding of science, get them involved in the community, and better appreciate how chemistry plays a role in our everyday lives. Our local chapter celebrates its seventh year this school year.


Our premier event each school year is our ChemDay presented by club members to students in the Intermediate grades 4 and 5. This full-day event offers ChemClub members the opportunity to share what they have learned about Chemistry through demonstrations and hands-on activities. This year we offered 12 different demonstrations including a "Whoosh Bottle", which demonstrates combustion and the formation of water and carbon dioxide with a nice "whoosh" of flames and carbon dioxide gas! Another favorite is the "Elephant's Toothpaste" demonstration where oxygen is removed from hydrogen peroxide producing a foamy column of colored "toothpaste" large enough for an elephant to use! Other demonstrations include "Colored Flames" and the science behind fireworks, "The Gold Rush" where plating of metals is demonstrated by turning a penny from copper to "silver" to "gold". Of course, there is the all-time favorite, making of "Slime", to end the demonstrations. Each student leaves the event with slime that they have made using polyvinyl alcohol (the active

ingredient in school glue) and a solution of household borax. The students learn that the PVA is like a long line of train cars and they are "linked together" by the borax crosslinker to make longer trains that form the slime. The ChemClub members explain

the science behind each demonstration on a level the Intermediate students may relate to.

Our ChemClub offers additional community service in the form of our campus-wide recycling program. Twice each week, ChemClub members collect recyclables from classrooms and offices in the High School, Middle School, and Intermediate School and place them in our campus recycling dumpster. Items that are recycled include; paper, plastic, metals, and cardboard. This program began in 2014.

ChemClub funds its activities through Valentine CandyGram sales to all campuses the week before Valentine's Day. The funds earned from this fundraiser go toward our ChemDay event, ChemClub scholarships, and our annual ChemClub field trip. Our field trip is to a science-related venue each year. In the past, we have visited SciPort in Shreveport, LA; Perot Museum of Nature and Science in Dallas, TX; and the Dallas World



Aquarium in Dallas, TX.

This year, the ChemClub will be offering two Scholarship, one for \$1000 and another for \$500, to deserving Senior club member to be used toward college expenses. Seniors will apply for the scholarships and reward will be granted by a Scholarship Committee.

I am very proud to be the sponsor of the New Diana ChemClub. When I first considered beginning this club, I envisioned about 20 students joining. This year we topped 60 members! I am so very proud of these students and their service to our school and community. As our club grows, we will be considering even more community service projects all while learning the value and importance of Chemistry in our classroom and in the world around us.
